- Archives use instills appreciation for collecting



Intellectual Control

- CARLOS concerts, orchestra library
 - Used to manage current concert activities
 - Becomes archival record documenting the concert
- DB/Textworks business records
 - Primary objective: maintain provenance
 - Adhere to traditional hierarchies
 - Maintain context
 - Description at folder level, not item level
- All records closed/embargoed 40-50 years



Ready to Digitize

- Leveraging what we've done
 - Maintain core principles of relationships and descriptive context
 - Replicate the physical research experience
 - Integrate existing electronic descriptive sources (CARLOS & DB/Textworks)
 - Be comprehensive
